WOMEN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS, CA

- domestic violence,
- gender-based violence,
- rape,
- kidnapping (Burulai case, KG),
- virginity tests (Tr),
- arranged marriage,
- incitement to suicide (Fariza case, TJ)



FORB VIOLATIONS AND WOMEN

- Reduced access to education
- Forced conversion
- Coercion to wear (or not) specific dress
- Partial administration of justice
- Verbal and physical harassment
- Restriction to participate in political life
- Early and forced marriage
- Incitement to suicide







UNDERMINES

- Patriarchal values
- Cultural and 'religious' traditions and practices
- Religious nationalism
- Women are also active agents of upholding these systems

GENDERED IMPACT OF FORB VIOLATIONS

- As many FoRB violations for women happen in the private/domestic sphere, they are not always visible
 - Often perpetrated by family and community members
 - Often have social impacts (early marriage, financial insecurity, etc.)
 - Often blend into other discriminatory practices
- FoRB violations impacting women from minority and majority groups differently:
 - Access to education
 - Forced conversions
 - Sexual harassment
- FoRB violations impacting men are more likely to be in the public sphere:
 - Physical violence, economic harassment at work/job/business and imprisonment
 - Can impact their family's financial and physical security



GENDER INEQUALITY IN FORB PROTECTION

- Until recently research and data on FoRB violations was gender-blind
 - GBV related to FoRB often blended in with other areas like domestic violence, and not recognized as violations against religious minorities/groups
- Legal protections are often unequal for women and LGBTI+ groups, leaving some more vulnerable to violations and reducing access to justice
 - Muslim women have fewer protections in Muslim communities
 - Women and religious minorities more likely to access informal justice systems, which are still highly patriarchal (refer to local religious leaders)
 - LGBT is not even on the case
- FoRB protection programs often focus on public violations that impact men
- Gender experts and organizations do not see religious women as part of their beneficiaries/clients

OPPORTUNITIES

- Reframe / localize Gender and FORB
- Build coalitions and dialogue between women's rights and FoRB activities increase understanding of their common goal
- Improve data collection practices to capture women's voices and address the gender gap and data bias
- Research to understand intersections of gender and FoRB better
- Discussion and reflections on women's rights and theology to overcome skepticism around both FoRB and women's rights within their religious and cultural contexts
- Improve access to justice and legal standards for all
- Positive masculinity campaign. Work with male leadership to champion women's rights to FoRB
